  - A. Establish Command
  - B. Situation Analysis

  - E. Resource Analysis

  - G. Appoint Operations Section Chief

  - I. Establish Scene Security, secure perimeter

- II. Required Functions

    - 1. Tactics: now that we're here, how should we proceed to find clues?
    - 2. Develop Subject Profile
    - 3. Resource Requirements: what resources (people, equipment) will we need?
  - C. Assignment Identification: what specific tasks should be apportioned.
  - D. Operations
    - 1. Team Assignment: gather groups of people and register them.
    - 2. Briefing: describe what's to be done and what's being sought. (page 223)
    - 3. Debriefing: learn what teams found. (page 226)
  - E. Communications
    - 1. Team and Assignment Tracking: Track each team's status and requests of management.
    - 2. Status Summary: Keep an overview of how the tactics are being employed.

    - 1. Callout (Additional Resources): get resources as communicated by Planning group.

    - 3. Inventory: what do we have? Where can we get it?
    - 4. Check-out: equipment to teams.
    - 5. Check-in: equipment from teams.

    - 1. Parking: maintain safety and access.
    - 2. Transportation: get teams to and from assignments.
